When I went to recertify they didn't want to take a chance on me because they didn't want to put patients in danger.

I have a wife who has been a CNA for 20+ years. We have 9 children from 33 years old to 6 years old; 2 boys and 7 girls and one grandson.

I love the environment at DLC. The people are always here to help. They sit down and show you and help you and support you through the good and the bad. And they will not let you quit. I've been working on DLC for a year and a half. I plan to be finished by June. When I started the program I needed Earth Science, Biology, Physical Science, Government, Algebra and US History and Spanish. I'm Yasmeen Alderhally. I came from Jordan in 2014. I started learning English in A+ English Language School from 2016 to now.

Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to give you some examples of difficulties I faced while I have no English skills: to communicate with my children's teacher, going to the library, shopping, getting my driver's license, listening to TV news and understanding it, answering phone calls I received at home for something important, and so on and so forth.

Now I am attending the A+ English Language School studying English. I am thinking deeply about continuing my education in LCC or MSU to get my teaching license to become a math teacher as this was what I was in Jordan. I have learned many things including how to communicate with others, how to drive and locate things on a map, information about health and public education. My communication and listening skills have improved greatly.

Education is very important to my family, especially my children. My daughter Salma attends the International Preschool at my school. Since she started she has grown and developed so much.

She began in the preschool when she was two years and a half. At that time she could only speak a few words in Arabic. Now she is able to spell her name (S-A-L-M-A), she knows many letters, and colors (such as white, red, blue). And she can count from 1 to 15. She knows how to ask for a drink of water and when she needs help.

Adult education is very important to me and my family in helping me and my children in the American life. I have learned survival English to make a better family, community and society. Thank you.

My name is Alix. I came from France with my husband and children last year. We spent one year in Boston for my husband's studies, but then he found a job here in Detroit in October.

I just started going to the ESL program this past January. Last year, I couldn't take English lessons for financial and family reasons. I encountered a lot of difficulties when trying to communicate with the teachers of my children, students' parents, my neighbors, workers at the supermarket, our physician and dentist, and even with the friends of my kids!

With time, I have improved my comprehension and added some vocabulary. I can follow discussions more easily, however it is still difficult for me to speak and to express my thoughts.

I love the program because it's been so helpful in improving my English. It's the perfect place to speak freely, to be corrected, and simply to learn! Our teacher teaches us grammar, vocabulary, comprehension, and pronunciation. These skills are essential for me to feel socially integrated here! For example, since I've started taking this ESL class, I have dared to do volunteering in my children's classes at school, speak more with people, and had an appointment with my dentist, which feels much easier now. Furthermore, the ESL program will allow me to start searching for a job with more confidence in the future.

Finally, I would like to say that I think it's fundamental that the state continues to fund these programs. It has allowed a better and faster social integration for me.

Good afternoon, my name is Taylor and I'm very honored to be here to speak about adult education. June of last year, at the ripe old age of 27, I received my High School Diploma from the Lapeer County Intermediate School District. I never intended to graduate high school in my late 20's, then again I never thought I would be a drop out in the first place. I left school before the start of my junior year to get a job and help my family pay the bills.

For a while I tried homeschooling and was able to get through a few credits, but after so long school was put on the back burner and eventually given up on all together. After that, my life seemed to move too fast for me to catch up. I had 2 baby girls, got married, and moved into our first home all by the age of 22. For the next 3 years I stayed home and raised my daughters. Money was tight and as much as I wanted to get a job, the only ones that seemed available to me without a High School Diploma or GED were minimum wage and wouldn't have even covered our child care costs. My life had essentially stalled, and I was frustrated.

I always felt like I was capable of more, and after years of living with the shame and embarrassment of not having graduated High School, I decided to sign up. Going back ended up being one of the best decisions I have ever made. Meeting the other students there and learning their stories was interesting and enriching.

The teachers were caring and encouraging, they not only wanted to see students graduate but to expand their minds, and learn to try harder in all aspects of life. Many of my teachers worked full time at other schools during the day and would still come to night classes and be enthusiastic and patient even though they must have been exhausted. I will always look back and admire and appreciate their dedication.

When I look at my future now it looks a lot brighter, and that's because I was fortunate enough to have access to an adult education program. Thank you.



Hello my name is Marisol Warunek. I am a graduate of the Washtenaw Community College (WCC) Adult Transitions GED Pathways Program in Ann Arbor, MI.

I grew up in Southwest Detroit. As a small kid in a rough neighborhood I was subject to bullying that began in elementary school. Over time the bullying caused me to lose interest and fall behind. My teachers did their best to encourage my interest but by the time I reached middle school they were unable to help me deal with the three girls who were harassing me every day. I found myself avoiding school, attending just enough to not be dropped. By the time, I reached the 8<sup>th</sup> grade I was 16 years old and had no hope of being successful in high school. Against my parents' wishes I dropped out with the promise of earing my GED. Like many of my peers' I enrolled in several different GED programs but never managed to finish.

I worked in a series of low paying mostly waitress and clerk jobs for many years. Until a friend saw potential in me and gave me a chance for a great job as a Manager in her music store. We were in business for four years and over that time I also became the music buyer and the bookkeeper. When the recession came, we could no longer afford to stay in business and I found myself unemployed without an education. So, I decided to go back to school to earn my GED and move onto college.

I came to the WCC Adult Transitions GED Pathways Program in the winter of 2011. I was a 35-year-old single mom with an 11-year-old boy who was struggling in school. How could I tell him that working hard and finishing school was important if I had not done it myself? My desire to set a good example for my son was one of the biggest motivations for me to follow through and finish this time.

Walking into the classroom for the first time in over ten years was scary for me. I felt worried that I would be the oldest student in the class and that I would fail. I was pleasantly surprised to discover that there were students of all ages and that I was not the only one who felt that way. The thing that made the biggest difference for me was the faculty and staff in the Adult Transitions program. Everyone from my teacher to the program manager was invested in my success and supported me every step of the way.

I discovered that the test I had been afraid of for so long was not as hard as I thought. I earned my GED with high honors in one semester. It was such a life changing experience to finally conquer that scary GED test. Now I had the confidence to know I could do anything I set my mind to. I was the student speaker at my graduation ceremony. When I transitioned to college I was no longer intimidated and I excelled in all of my classes earning honors in every semester. I graduated from WCC with an Associate's degree in Liberal Arts and am now working on a business degree with WCC and Eastern Michigan University.

In my second semester of college my counselor from the Adult Transitions program called me and asked if I would like to become a mentor for the program. I said yes immediately I could not wait to help other students earn their GED and move on to their next best step like I did. While I was working as a mentor, I was offered a job in the college counseling office. This job afforded me the ability to continue to work on my Associate's degree and care for my teenage son. About a year later a full time position opened up in the Adult Transitions department for an Administrative Assistant/Data Technician. I was excited about



the opportunity to work once again for a program that makes such a difference in people's lives. I applied and after the interview I was offered the job. I found out that one of the deciding factors in hiring me was my previous commitment to the students in the Adult Transitions program. Now I come to work every day to a job I love, working for the program that changed my life.

Without this program who knows where I would be today. Probably working several low wage jobs still feeling fear and shame that I did not go back to school and finish my education. Instead I have high hopes for my future. My son is now 16 and a junior in High School earning good grades. My goal is to finish my Bachelor's degree at Eastern and then I would like to find a position in my local government or state legislature to help improve the lives of others that may face the same challenges I did.

Good morning honorable legislators, education committee members, adult education staff and students,

I am truly honored to speak before you today. My name is Jacklyn Perkins and I am 58 years old. I want to let you know how important my school is to me. I enrolled in Adult Education classes at Detroit Public Schools Community District – West Campus about four years ago. These four years have not been easy for me, but with the help of the teachers and staff, I am where I am now.

I stopped attending high school in the tenth grade. I had just found out that I was pregnant, and I was too ashamed to go back to school. I went through most of my life without a high school diploma. I completed a CNA program and became a doctor's assistant. When I went to renew my license, I was told that I needed a high school diploma or GED. That's when I enrolled back in classes.

I started at a seventh grade reading level and a third grade math level. Ms. Fletcher and Ms. Macon got me through the basic math skills. Then, I had Ms. Walters for two years. She drove me like a bus and often made me cry, but she never gave up on me. With her help, I successfully passed three parts of the GED – Language Arts, Social Studies, and Science. That year, I was also inducted into the National Adult Education Honor Society. Mr. Roe has been my math teacher for the last two years. He makes me cry too, but I feel like I'm getting there slowly but surely, and I hope to pass my math test and receive my GED before graduation in June. I can honestly say that it hasn't been easy, but when things got hard, my teachers stepped up and literally held my hand.

I love my school. Everyone is caring and understanding and has the students' best interest in mind. At the end of last year, I had gotten so frustrated and I told Principal Willis that I was done and won't be coming back to school. Ms. Willis said, "Jackie, you only have one subject to pass. You can't quit now. You've come too far. I don't want to hear. it Go to class." I love her for that, and anytime I feel like quitting, I think to myself, "No, Jackie, you have come too far. You can't quit now." My school offers free lunch, bus tickets for students who need transportation, and even free vouchers for testing when you're ready. My school also has a clothing closet. One day I came to school and the weather had changed. My teacher directed me to the clothing closet and helped me pick out a warm coat that fit me. I still wear the coat when the weather gets cold.

I am the only person in my family that doesn't have a high school diploma, and I won't stop until I reach my goal. I must admit that I've thought about quitting too many times, but the teachers and staff of the West Campus didn't let me. They are my inspiration. I have everything that I need to be successful at no cost to me. I know that there are many people in the city that are in a similar situation as me, and I know that they would benefit from this program.

Thank you for letting me share my story. I am grateful to have this opportunity to further my education and create a better future for myself. I have seen so many students and people from my community benefit from this adult education program, and I hope that this program will continue to be funded.

My name is Rafael. I'm 34 years old, and I'm from Brazil. I've been in the US since last October when I received an offer of employment from the same company I worked for in South America, and today I'm going to share with you how ESL classes have made an impact on my day to day life.

Moving to another country is not the easiest decision to make, especially when you are married and your wife cannot even order a meal or go to the supermarket alone. Nonetheless, we have accepted this new challenge believing it would be a remarkable opportunity for us as a couple, and in a professional sense, as well. Everybody knows how important it is to know how to speak English!

As soon as we arrived in Michigan, we started looking for good English schools for the two of us, focusing on vocabulary and accent for me and English basics for her. We heard about several good options from some friends. ESL classes for foreigners are a must! This is not my first time taking English classes abroad. I was in Canada in 2012 for a month. It was a great experience, however, I spent a lot of money and did not learn that much considering the tight schedule and the routine and focus of those English classes. But, I'm not here to say who is better than who. My wife and I decided to take English classes at Troy Continuing Education, and we are so glad to be a part of this new family. I'm really impressed with how the program can make people committed and excited about coming to class. You know, it isn't easy going to school after a busy day at work. We are often exhausted being "forced" to speak a foreign language, like my wife does twice a week and I do on a daily basis. It can be very frustrating when you try to express your thoughts by yourself but can't do it accurately in a new language. It's so important to learn formal English, but it's also necessary to speak informal English in casual settings. We watch TV shows and movies and hear informal English every single place we visit, and that's exactly what I'm learning at school. We learn English for daily situations and for professional uses. I've seen improvement in my speech day after day!

In summary, one of the things I like most about our ESL class is the synergy between us. It doesn't matter which country you are coming from. When we do group exercises, you learn how to socialize, and it's a really good thing. You can practice your listening, writing and vocabulary, considering that everybody in your class is learning English as a Second Language.

I would like to start off by thanking all of you for allowing me to be here today to speak about the importance of adult education and the impact it has had on my life.

My name is Samantha Neubacher and I am a 24 year old student at Asher Alternative High School in Southgate. Going back to being a teenager, I loved school. I had friends, I played sports, and my grades were good. It wasn't until high school when I started to decline academically. I had a hard time paying attention. I was never completely focused while in class. I began getting awful migraines that left me sick in bed, not being able to make it to class some days. I was confused how I ended up this way, while all of my friends where enjoying their high school years, I was miserably hating mine. I became so behind in school, I was told I wouldn't be graduating with my class in 2011. I was devastated; I became awfully depressed and eventually I stopped going to school.

Shortly after I stopped attending school, I became sicker. The migraines continued and I started having seizures, later finding out I have a rare brain disease called MoyaMoya. MoyaMoya is a cerebrovascular disease. It constricts the blood vessels making blood flow to your brain minimal. It all started making sense to my family, why I was getting the migraines, seizures, and the reason for my lack of attention and downfall in school. After finding my diagnosis, I tried 2 more times at getting my diploma, but I still wasn't able to pay attention and grasp
