Detroit Parents Pose Early Childhood Issues before State House Candidates

Michigan's Children, Think Babies Michigan, Detroit Champions for Hope, Congress of Communities to Host Virtual Forum Sept. 26th in Eight Legislative Races

DETROIT – Michigan's Children, the Think Babies Michigan initiative, and two Detroit-based advocacy groups are teaming up to host a virtual parent-led candidate forum featuring candidates in eight State House races on Monday, Sept. 26, 2022 (1:00-3:00 pm).

Detroit Champions for Hope, affiliated with the early-childhood advocacy group, Hope Starts Here, and the Congress of Communities, a youth-focused advocacy group founded in Southwest Detroit, will field parents from Detroit to tell their stories and ask questions around early childhood issues.

Invited candidates are from House races in the 1st, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th districts. There's been a strong response from invited candidates planning to attend.

There are a plethora of family and community issues on the minds of parent leaders heading up next week's forum. They want to share their experiences, and hear from candidates, on early childhood education, child care, the early childhood workforce shortage, families with disabilities, the teacher shortage, mental health, affordable housing, the effects of the economy on families, student loan relief, and charter school issues.

Invited candidates by House race are: 1st District – Tyrone Carter (D) and Paula Campbell (R); 4th District – Karen Whitsett (D) and Tonya Renay Wells (R); 5th District – Natalie Price (D) and Paul Taros (R); 6th District – Regina Weiss (D) and Charles Villerot (R); Helena Scott (D); 8th District – Mike McFall (D) and Robert Noble (R); 9th District – Abraham Aiyash (D) and Michele Lundgren (R); 10th District – Joe Tate (D) and Mark Corcoran (R).

Amanda Holiday, Early Childhood Programs Director for the Congress of Communities, said local elections are more important than ever. "It is imperative that Detroit residents know about the candidates they are choosing to make the vital decisions that impact their everyday lives," she said.

Tommara Grice, President of Detroit Champions for Hope, said parents want to know how legislative candidates will prioritize family and early childhood priorities this election cycle. "Detroit Champions for Hope is committed to early childhood system building and connecting community champions to problem solvers," Grice added.

Matt Gillard, President & CEO of Michigan's Children, said he is thrilled to see such strong civic engagement by parents affiliated with the local partner groups. "Really, that's what elections are all about – voters speaking up, and candidates listening to the voices of constituents - to make policy decisions in the best interest of kids and families. It puts the power back where it belongs – with the people."

Media interviews with hosts and questioners are welcomed.

The sponsoring organizations are planning a second online forum on Oct. 24, 2022 for candidates in state Senate races including the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 6th, 8th and 10th districts.
