## Kalamazoo Youth Invite House and Senate Candidates to Forum to Talk about Issues that Concern them at Home, in School

KYD Network, YMCA, Michigan's Children Sponsor Civic Event on Monday, Oct. 10

**Kalamazoo**, **Mich**. - The stage is set for one of the most distinctive candidate forums in Kalamazoo with youth from the <u>Kalamazoo Youth Development Network (KYD Network)</u> and the <u>YMCA of Greater Kalamazoo</u> interviewing office-seekers in state Senate and House races about the issues that concern them the most.

School-age youth, as young as 14, will address topics they've selected of personal and community interest - community violence, school violence and mental health – on **Monday, Oct. 10, 2022**, at the **Kalamazoo Promise Building in Room 1209**. The event runs from **4:30-6:30 p.m**.

Organizers have invited candidates in the **40**<sup>th</sup> **House District race** (representing southwest Kalamazoo and Portage), the **41**<sup>st</sup> **House District race** (located in Kalamazoo), and the **19**<sup>th</sup> **state Senate race** (including Kalamazoo County). <u>Michigan's Children</u> has joined KYD Network and the YMCA in assisting youth with the forum.

Invited candidates are: state Rep. Christine Morse (D) and Kelly Sackett (R) in the 40<sup>th</sup> House race; state Rep. Julie Rogers (D) and Terry Haines (R) in the 41<sup>st</sup> House race; and Sen. Sean McCann (D) and Tamara Mitchell (R) in the 19<sup>th</sup> state Senate race.

KYD Network's Executive Director Meg Blinkiewicz said that community youth relish the opportunity to bring their issues before candidates. They see it as an opportunity to educate candidates, and hold them accountable if elected. "We talk a lot about youth having agency . . . influence over their lives and future. Youth also don't pull any punches and ask pointed questions. What better way to exercise agency than to participate in this democratic process? Blinkiewicz added.

Michigan's Children's President & CEO Matt Gillard said Kalamazoo youth have been important partners in youth-led candidate forums in the past, and is impressed with their level of commitment this year again. "Elections are all about candidates listening to the voices of constituents, and elevating work around solving community problems" Gillard said. "This forum – these youths - aim to do just that."
