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## One in Six Adults are Functionally Illiterate – This Candidate Forum Wants to Talk about That with Those Running for Congress, the State Legislature and County Board

**Muskegon Heights, Mich**. - The stage is set for one of the most distinctive candidate forums in Muskegon, bringing federal, state, and county commission candidates together with community members focused on reading and literacy. The candidate forum is sponsored by <u>Read Muskegon</u>, the <u>Michigan Adult</u>, <u>Community & Alternative Education Association</u> (MACAE), and <u>Michigan's Children</u>.

The event – **"A Community-Led Candidate Forum on Education & Literacy"** - will take place on **Monday**, **Sept. 26, 2022** (**5:00 pm to 7:30 pm**) at Covenant Community Church in Muskegon Heights, 134 E Barney Ave, Muskegon, MI 49444.

Organizers have invited candidates from the newly drawn 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Congressional districts; the 32<sup>nd</sup> State Senate District; the 87<sup>th</sup>, 88<sup>th</sup>, 89<sup>th</sup>, and 102<sup>nd</sup> State House districts; and the Muskegon County Board of Commissioners Districts 1-7.

This forum is presented as a non-partisan activity. It is <u>not a debate</u>. Neither do the event sponsors endorse candidates.

Forum organizers point to the high illiteracy rate in the United States – translating to one in six adults who are functionally illiterate or reading at or below the 4th grade level – as a concern for not only family economic stability but community health. In Muskegon County, that equates to more than 23,000 adults, and they say more needs to be done to break those barriers here at home.

"The adverse effects of illiteracy are felt in our economic, education, criminal justice, and healthcare systems," said **Read Muskegon Executive Director Melissa Moore**, who is leading the candidate forum. "Read Muskegon is breaking the generational cycle of illiteracy by providing customized programs that meet the unique needs of our learners and building community partnerships to maximize our impact. We have a lot to talk about to strengthen the skills and earning potential of thousands of our residents."

Forums like these are an important place for policymakers to hear directly from those they intend to serve, said **MACAE's Executive Director Patrick Brown, the evening's emcee**. "This forum is a good space to articulate the needs of some of our state's most marginalized populations –low literate, low income," he added. "This is also part of a broader conversation around how the adult education community is well situated to address issues in our state that are related to literacy – the state's talent shortages, economic strength, workplace literacy, and gainful employment."

**Matt Gillard,** President & CEO, Michigan's Children, said he's been impressed to see the strong level of commitment in the Muskegon community to bring voters and candidates together around the issue of literacy, an often unspoken problem in society. "Elections are all about candidates listening to the voices of constituents, and elevating work around solving community problems" Gillard said. "This forum aims to do just that."
